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Considering Offer of a Reward for Cocking and Randolph Lynchers.

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Cumberland, Md., July 6.—Gov. Lowndes to-day denounced the lynching of Joseph Cocking, the alleged murderer of his wife and sister-in-law, in Charles County, and Sidney Randolph, the alleged assailant of the Buxton family, in Montgomery County, in most emphatic terms. He said that the lynchings were great outrages.

"We are spending a large sum of money to induce the best class of immigrants, the Legislature appropriating a sum for the support of an immigration bureau," he said, "but people will not risk their lives by settling in communities where men are dragged out of jail and lynched, especially when there are grave doubts as to their guilt."

The Governor further said that the au-
